University Library of Columbus and the Center for Teaching & Learning

Nearly forty examples of historic and classical works from the Remnant Trust are currently on display at the University Library of Columbus, thanks to a partnership of Ivy Tech Community College, with IUPUC, Purdue College of Technology, the University Library of Columbus, the Center for Teaching and Learning and the Columbus Learning Center. A complete list of the titles contained in this collection is printed on the reverse.

This exhibit will be on display from August 25 through December 12, 2008. The University Library of Columbus is open Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m., Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturdays from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m.

We encourage groups to schedule field trips to the Library to view the entire collection. We ask that groups larger than ten people notify us at least **one week in advance** of their arrival by contacting Delora Antle at 812.314.8709 or emailing her at dantle@columbusctl.com. When staffing permits, Library staff will pull one of the items from the display so that the group can experience these classics first hand. **Teachers sponsoring the field trip are responsible for instruction** – framing the relevance and significance of the Remnant Trust documents on display.

Part of the mission of the Remnant Trust is to allow people to experience these treasures firsthand. Instructors are encouraged to use these items in their classrooms.

- Due to the rarity and value of the Remnant Trust materials, all items must be returned to the Library Information Desk before closing on the same day it is checked out. Failure to comply with these rules will result in heavy fines and may result in the loss of borrowing privileges. Delivery to your school may be available in some instances.
